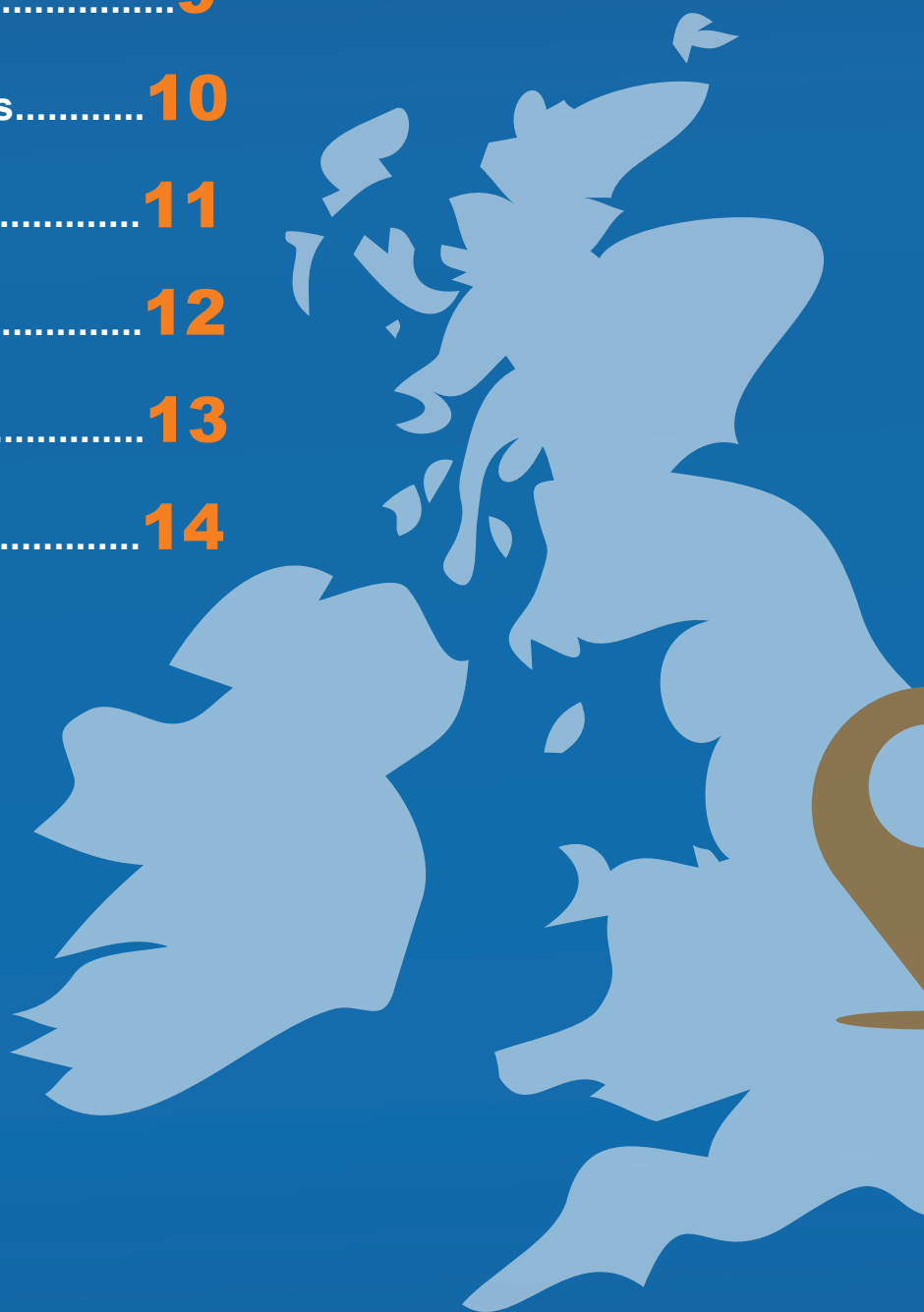

Living in London

When living in such a vibrant and exciting city, there will never be a dull day. On your door step you will find the charm of local community events, independent shops and restaurants and charming parks, all with excellent transport across the capital thanks to the London over and underground (the tube).

Different boroughs are known for different communities, with working families enjoying areas like Bromley and Wembley while working professionals enjoy Shoreditch, Clapham and Brixton. Each area has its own charm that needs to be seen to be believed, but some areas you might recognise include...

- **Camden – the home of punk fashion and music**
- **Kensington – where the Natural History and Science Museums are**
- **Southwark – close to the docks**
- **Stratford – for the Olympic park**
- **Wembley – home to the arena and stadium**



Cost of living

The cost of renting or owning a place will vary depending on location, as with any major city living in the outskirts will see cheaper house prices than closer to the city centre. The following costs are averages across London.

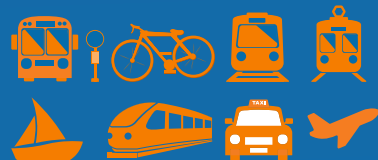

Public transport in London



By bus, bike, train, taxi tram, tube, boat & plane



London is a well-connected city, where you can travel by bus, bike, tram, tube or even by boat! The big red buses will take you across the city by road, while the tube will have you whizzing through the underground.

You can tap contactless payments throughout tube and bus stops with a daily cap cost of £15.60 across zones 1 to 6, but for frequent public transport users we recommend getting an Oyster card which you can top up, or purchase a weekly/monthly bus and tram pass.

To zip through the city, common taxi companies like Bolt and Uber are available across London, Uber even have a service that will take you across the River Thames!

A popular choice for Londoners is to rent a Lime bike, which you can rent via an app, cycle across the city and then drop off in dozens of locations across London.

The UK Education System

Each term in an education setting is usually 13 weeks long, with a week off halfway through, called half term.

You can expect around two weeks off at the end of term one and term two, for Christmas and Easter respectively. When the school year ends, you can expect six weeks off for the summer holidays.

Each region of the UK varies with its exact term dates, so please see this as a rough guide. You'll often find Year 11s and Year 13s may finish earlier, depending on where their last exams fall. For more detailed curriculum information, head to [GOV.UK](https://www.gov.uk) or check your local council's website for specific term dates.

The UK curriculum will, of course, be different from what you are used to. But you'll be surprised at how many similarities there are with your home country's curriculum. Here's a handy guide for you to reference, for more information visit the [UK Government's website](https://www.gov.uk).
