



Public transport in Manchester

By bus, tram and train



Across Manchester City Centre and Greater Manchester, you can travel with ease using the buses and tram network. Buses operate across the city centre for free up to 11:30 pm (6 pm on Sundays) while tram tickets can be bought in advance or using the smart readers at tram stops. Tram and train tickets can't be bought once you board, so be sure to buy in advance or risk a fine.

Bus, tram and train passes are available daily, weekly, monthly and annually, use the ticket finder to secure the best ticket for you. You can plan your journey using [the Bee Network website](#).

National Rail, air and coaches

Manchester is well-connected to the rest of the UK, and you can visit many major towns and cities in a short train, coach or car ride. Manchester Airport has flights to Northern and Southern Ireland and parts of Europe like Palma de Mallorca, Rome, Athens and Barcelona.

Each term in an education setting is usually 13 weeks long, with a week off halfway through, called half term.

You can expect around two weeks off at the end of term one and term two, for Christmas and Easter respectively. When the school year ends, you can expect six weeks off for the summer holidays.

Each region of the UK varies with its exact term dates, so please see this as a rough guide. You'll often find Year 11s and Year 13s may finish earlier, depending on where their last exams fall. For more detailed curriculum information, head to [GOV.UK](https://www.gov.uk) or check your local council's website for specific term dates.
